## French 1B

### I. Vocabulary

- **Chapter 7 (p. 225)**  
Identifying people (p. 203); family members (p. 204, 207); introducing people (p. 207); describing someone (p. 208, 209); asking for, giving, refusing permission (p. 213); household chores (p. 213).
- **Chapter 8 (p. 259)**  
Foods (fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy, condiments) (p. 235, 238); expressing need (p. 238); making, accepting, and declining requests and telling someone what to do (p. 240); quantities (p. 242); meals (p. 245); offering, accepting, or refusing food (p. 247).
- **Chapter 9 (p. 291)**  
Asking for and expressing opinions (p. 269); inquiring about and relating past events (p. 270); describing a typical day (p. 273); making and answering a phone call (p. 275, 276); sharing confidences and consoling others, asking for and giving advice (p. 279).
- **Chapter 10 (p. 321)**  
Clothing items (p. 297); asking for and giving advice (p. 300); expressing need and inquiring (p. 301); asking for an opinion, paying a compliment, and criticizing (p. 306); hesitating, making a decision (p. 310).
- **Chapter 11 (p. 349)**  
Vacation spots (p. 327); activities that can be done on vacation (p. 327); inquiring about and sharing future plans, expressing indecision, expressing wishes (p. 329); items to take for a vacation (p. 333); reminding, reassuring (p. 333); seeing someone off (p. 336); asking for and expressing opinions (p. 337).
- **Chapter 12 (p. 383)**  
Specialty shops and stores (p. 359); pointing out places and things (p. 361); making and responding to requests (p. 364); asking for advice and making suggestions (p. 366); modes of transportation (p. 366); asking for and giving directions (p. 369, 371).

### II. Culture

- Review all the culture notes from chapters 7 through 12

### III. Grammar

- Using **de** to indicate relationship or ownership (p. 204): Le livre de Pierre est bleu → Pierre's book is blue
- Possessive adjectives (**mon, ton, son ; ma, ta, sa ; mes, tes, ses ; notre, votre, leur ; nos, vos, leurs**) (p. 205)
- Adjective agreement (singular/plural/masculine/feminine) (p. 210): remember the table!
- Partitive and indefinite articles, incl. in negative sentences (p. 236): un, une, des, du, de la, de l' → de or d' in a negative sentence

- Expression “**avoir besoin de**” (p. 238): Tu as besoin d’un crayon → you need a pencil.
- Quantities followed by **de** or **d’** (p. 242): beaucoup, un litre, un kilo, un paquet, une tranche, etc.
- Pronoun **en** [some] (p. 248): Tu veux un coca ? → Oui, j’en veux
- The *passé composé* with **avoir** – helping verb followed by past participle (p. 271): conjugate avoir in the present tense (j’ai, tu as, il/elle/on a, nous avons, vous avez, ils/elles ont) and add the past participle of the verb you are using
- Adverb placement when used with the *passé composé* (p. 272): the adverb always goes in front of the past participle → J’ai beaucoup étudié pour mon examen.
- Object pronouns (direct – le, la, les, l’ and indirect – lui, leur) (p. 279, 309)
- Using adjectives as nouns (p. 301): il adore la chemise verte → il adore la verte.
- Using **à** in front of a city (à Paris), **en** in front of a feminine (or vowel) country (en France), **au** in front of a masculine country (au Mexique), and **aux** in front of a plural country (aux Etats-Unis) (p. 330)
- Pronoun **y** [there] (p. 367)
- Preposition **de** combined with definite articles: **de + le = du, de + les = des, de la, de l’** (p. 369)

#### IV. Verbs and how to conjugate them

- **être** (p. 211) – je suis, tu es, il/elle/on est, nous sommes, vous êtes, ils/elles sont  
- past participle : **été**
- **pouvoir** (p. 241) – je peux, tu peux, il/elle/on peut, nous pouvons, vous pouvez, ils/elles peuvent  
- past participle : **pu**
- **RE verbs** (attendre, répondre, vendre, perdre) (p. 277) – j’attends, tu attends, il/elle/on attend, nous attendons, vous attendez, ils/elles attendent  
- past participle : **drop RE and replace with U – j’ai attendu**
- **mettre** (p. 299) – je mets, tu mets, il/elle/on met, nous mettons, vous mettez, ils/elles mettent  
- past participle : **mis**
- **porter** (p. 299) – je porte, tu portes, il/elle/on porte, nous portons, vous portez, ils/elles portent  
- past participle : **porté**
- **IR verbs** (choisir, grandir, maigrir, grossir) (p. 303) – je choisis, tu choisis, il/elle/on choisit, nous choisissons, vous choisissez, ils/elles choisissent  
- past participle : **drop R – j’ai choisi**
- **irregular IR verbs** (partir, sortir, dormir) (p. 334) – je dors, tu dors, il/elle/on dort, nous dormons, vous dormez, ils/elles dorment  
- past participle : **drop R – j’ai dormi**
